The 2025 winner of this award will be announced at the 2025 graduation exercises on June 21, 2025.



RULES AND REGULATIONS

Admission to Fairgrounds will be:

**Adults - \$5; Students - \$4; Preschool – Free
Family - \$5/ parent, \$4/child for first 2 children,
remaining children \$2/child
Horse Entrants - \$5/entrant**

1. Memberships do not grant admission to the Fair grounds.

2. Your membership number will also be your entry number; each of your exhibits must have the proper tag with this number on it. Children not requiring a membership may register with their teacher for a number.

3. All entries in CLASS R - SCHOOL WORK must be entered no later than Friday, June 27, 2025. Attendees of Maryfield School are to leave their entries in the school library. Other entrants can drop off entries at the school office. All other indoor exhibit articles must be entered, properly tagged and in place by 9 a.m. the day of the Fair. You can pay your membership and get tags ahead of July 25 from Kate Smid, 306-375-7682. Contact Barb Swallow, 306-646-7725, for membership numbers as of July 25. **No entries accepted after 9:00 a.m. FAIR DAY.**

4. Exhibitors may enter in as many sections of each department as they wish. However, **admission to the Fairgrounds must be paid by everyone.**

5. Exhibitors may enter more than one animal in any section, if so desired. **All other exhibits, one entry only will be allowed to each section.** A fee will be required from each rider.

6. No third prize will be awarded in any of the livestock sections unless there is more than one exhibitor.

7. All animals and articles must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, except as otherwise required by the prize list, and products of the soil must have been grown on the premises occupied by the exhibitor during the current year. **All home manufactures and fancy work must be the work of the exhibitor. It cannot have been previously exhibited in the same section of the Fair.**

8. Entries and annual membership fees for the Horse Department and the Indoor Exhibits are separate.

(a) **Department A – Horses:** memberships are \$5 per family and \$4 per entry. There is \$5 gate fee per person in addition to membership fee.

(b) **Department B – Indoor Exhibits:** memberships will be \$5 per person plus \$1 per entry after the first five entries, with the following exceptions:

Class O – Junior Work: memberships are \$3; (if entering any other classes, the membership is \$5) plus \$1 per entry after the first five entries. Class O exhibits must be entered in the correct age category. **All exhibitors must have their age clearly marked without opening the entry tag.**

Class O Junior Work: PRESCHOOL entries are free.

Class R - School Work: All memberships are free.

9. No person may act as Judge in a Department in which he or she is an exhibitor.

10. All precautions, within the ability of the Society, for the safety of exhibits and persons at the Fair, will be taken by the Society, but no liability for loss, damage, or injury is undertaken by the Society. Exhibitors borrowing Fair property kindly return same to Directors from whom borrowed.

11. **Indoor Exhibits:** Protests affecting awards must be made in writing to the Secretary, before 5 p.m. on the day of the Fair, accompanied by \$5.00, which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained by a majority of Directors in meeting.

12. Any person or persons who shall interfere with the Judges, while in discharge of their duties or shall use contemptuous language within their hearing shall be ejected, and if an exhibitor, may forfeit any premium he may win and be barred from exhibiting for one year or thereafter.

13. All rink exhibits must be in place from 9 am to 4:30 pm and must be removed by 5 pm on FAIR DAY. Exhibits open to the public after judging is completed.

14. The Judges are expected to give reasons for their placings and discuss any points that arise in connection with awards, compatible with the time at their disposal.

15. Memberships may be obtained from Kate Smid any time before July 25th, 306-375-7682. Contact Barb Swallow, 306-646-7725, for membership numbers as of July 25.

16. Judges are chosen by the directors.

17. All animals exhibited must be secured in such a way as to fully protect the public. Exhibits of horses, except foals, must be shown on the halter. **No stallions will be allowed on the Fair grounds.**

18. All animals and articles are at the command of the Directors in Charge, while on the grounds.

19. Ages of all animals to be computed from January 1st of the current year.

20. No exhibitor will necessarily be awarded a prize unless deemed worthy by the Judge.

21. Horses not competing are not allowed to occupy Fair Buildings.

22. If circumstances prevent sufficient funds being available, the Society will divide prize monies among winners accordingly.

23. All cheques to be cashed by October 31, 2025.

NOTE: If your prize money is incorrect, please notify the treasurer.


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

Notice to Exhibitors

1. Horse entries close July 19, 2025, one week prior to the fair. Entries may be submitted to:

2. Memberships are \$5 per family. Entry fee of \$4 per class will be charged. \$5/person gate fee must be paid on entrance to the Fair grounds. Entry fee gives access to fair grounds for both days.

3. Horses to be on the grounds by 8:30 a.m. Judging begins at 9:00 a.m. Show office opens at 7:30 a.m. for registration.

4. It is up to each exhibitor to ensure your horses are accurately measured and entered in the appropriate class.

5. No stallions allowed on Fair Grounds or in the arena, with the exception of foals of the current year. Any person in violation of this rule will be asked to leave the grounds immediately.

6. Any protest must be made in writing. It must be submitted, along with \$25.00 cheque payable to the Show Committee, within **one hour** of the completion of the class in question. The Show Committee (and the judge, if they so choose) will review the protest and determine a ruling based on the rules and regulations under which the show is sanctioned.

7. Participants are requested to read carefully all rules governing this show. The Show committee reserves the right to decide any point not covered by the rules and to correct any errors in the prize list.

8. Classes may, at the show committee's discretion, be combined or cancelled if there are less than 3 entries. Entry fees will be refunded if a class is cancelled. All changes will be announced or printed.

9. In the case of any animal being disqualified, the winner of the next succeeding prize shall take the prize that was awarded to the disqualified animal and the other prizes adjusted accordingly.

Safety Rules for Horse Show


1. Each participant of the Maryfield Horse Show must sign an Acknowledgement of Risk and Release of Liability prior to participating in any classes.
2. No person other than officials may enter the ring without the permission of the show committee.
3. All youth under the age of 18 years as of January 1 of the current year are required to wear an approved ASTM/SEI helmet when participating in any competition sanctioned by the Saskatchewan Horse Federation for insurance purposes. Maryfield Agricultural Society will be enforcing this Rule. If you have a concern with this ruling, include it in writing with your entry.
4. Age of rider will be as of January 1 of the current year; as follows: 11 years & under; 12-17 years; Sr 18 years & over
5. Age of the horse is as of January 1 of the current year. Junior Horses are 5 years and under, and may be shown in a snaffle bridle and two hands may be used.
6. Exhibitors are to be at the hitching ring when their class is called. The gate will be held for tack changes when notified, for no more than 3 minutes.
7. Participants in horse classes are under the supervision of the judge and ringmaster. Any act of courtesy or disobedience to the officials on the part of the owner, groom or rider may disqualify the entry. Proper etiquette is expected of exhibitors and family members both in and out of the arena.
8. No alcohol is allowed in the arena. No person under the influence of alcohol is allowed in the arena.
9. No dogs are allowed in the riding arena or the hitching area. Dogs on the grounds must be on a leash and supervised at all times.
10. All animals must be secured in such a way as to protect the public. Covered outdoor tie stalls are available on a first come first serve basis.
11. Trailers and towing vehicles are to be parked in the specified area provided away from the general public.
12. Children under the age of 7 riding in the arena must be supervised by an adult.
13. Horses not competing are not allowed to occupy fair buildings.
14. All precautions within the ability of the Society for the safety of the exhibitors and persons at the Fair will be taken.

Pattern—SHF B

Horses may walk or trot to the center of arena. Horses must walk or stop prior to starting pattern. Beginning at the center of arena facing the left wall or fence.

1. Complete four spins to the left. Hesitate.
2. Complete four spins to the right. Hesitate.
3. Beginning on the right lead, complete three circles to the right: the first circle large and fast; the second circle small and slow; the third circle large and fast. Change leads at the center of the arena.
4. Complete three circles to the left: the first circle large and fast; the second circle small and slow; the third circle large and fast. Change leads at the center of the arena.
5. Begin a large fast circle to the right but do not close this circle. Run straight down the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a left rollback at least twenty feet (six meters) from the wall or fence—no hesitation.
6. Continue back around the previous circle but do not close this circle. Run down the left side of the arena past the center marker and do a right rollback at least twenty feet (six meters) from the wall or fence—no hesitation.
7. Continue back around the previous circle but do not close this circle. Run down the right side of the arena past the center marker and do a sliding stop at least twenty feet (six meters) from the wall or fence. Back up at least ten feet (three meters). Hesitate to demonstrate completion of the pattern.

Rider must dismount and drop bridle to the designated judge.




Pattern—SHF D

To be used as a modified pattern in the Heritage Circuit only.

Horses may walk or trot to the center of the arena. Horses must walk or stop prior to starting the pattern. Beginning at the center of the arena facing the left wall or fence.

1. Beginning on the left lead, complete two circles to the left. Stop at the center of the arena. Hesitate.
2. Complete two spins to the left. Hesitate.
3. Beginning on the right lead complete two circles to the right. Stop at the center of the arena. Hesitate.
4. Complete two spins to the right. Hesitate.
5. Beginning on the left lead, go around the end of the arena, run down the right side of the arena past center marker, stop and roll back right.
6. Continue around the end of the arena to run down the left side of the arena past the center marker. Stop. Back up.

Rider must dismount and drop the bridle to the designated judge.

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
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PHOTOGRAPHY HINTS:

1. FOCUS— Most of the time the main subject, at least, should be in focus and sharp even if the background and other components may not be. Notice the depth of field and see if it is working well for the image.
2. CLEAR SUBJECT IN THE PHOTOGRAPH—Does the photograph have a purpose. Is it clear what the main subject or subjects of the photograph are?
3. COMPOSITION—Again is it clear what the main subject is? Are there areas or parts of the photograph that do not contribute to the overall visual effect of the image. Is the subject lost in a distracting background? Consider vertical versus horizontal orientation of the image. How do the lines of the subject lead into or out of the photograph? Consider Rules of composition like “Rule of Thirds”.
4. LIGHTING AND EXPOSURE—Is the lighting well balanced, and does it support the elements of the composition to create the desired effect? Are there good shadow and highlight details with good range of shades in between? No ‘blown’ highlights except for some desired spectacular highlights.
5. COLOUR—Particularly in underwater photography is the colour well balanced? Are there any colour casts that detract from the image or do they genuinely help create mood or effect?

QUILTING TIPS

- Binding cut on the diagonal will lie smoother around curves and irregular edges.
- Quilts with intricate appliqué and piecing are a higher level of difficulty than those of preprinted panels.
- Modern quilts are gaining popularity with simpler lines, bold colours and prints and high contrast.
- 100% cotton is recommended because it's easy to work with in terms of cutting, sewing and pressing. Color schemes of light, medium, and dark fabric are favorable.
- Cotton thread is recommended but a good quality polyester thread can be used.
- Using the proper tools - cutting mat, rotary cutter, sewing machine needles, quilting needles and quilter's rulers – makes quilting much easier.
- Pre-washed fabric is optional.
- Straighten your fabric before cutting.
- Sew with an accurate 1/4 seam allowance.
- Press seams to the dark side if possible.
- Make sure you press your seams as you sew
- Press fabric – don't iron it as it stretches the fabric.
- Cut your batting and backing about 2 to 3 inches larger than your quilt top.
- Sandwich your quilt - quilt top, batting, and backing.
- Use curved pins to sandwich your quilt.
- Hand or machine quilting can be used to finish the quilt. When machine quilting, a walking foot is recommended.
- When tying a quilt, use good quality yarn (not too thick) or embroidery floss or long arm quilting.
- To bind your quilt, cut 2 1/4" or 2 1/2" strips.
- Seams should be nested accurately.
- Points should be sharp, not cut off.
- Circles should be round and consistent in size.
- There should be no pleats unless a part of the design.
- Binding around the quilt should be snug. The corners should be neat and square.
- The quilt should lay flat with no lumps.
- There must be sufficient quilting – stitching should be consistent in length and tightness.
- Creativity is important.
- Workmanship on the quilt should be pleasing to the eye.

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
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

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
